As people's taste in music generally reveals more about them than anything else, here's Aishani's – she describes it as a "khichdi" of rock, RnB, and jazz.



Shaurya Srivastava: "Supreme Court, Supreme Chaos"


Revanta Suri profiles the Rapporteur of the Supreme Court of India




Still, there's a softer layer. He's the kind of person who stays up all night before someone's first conference to help them prep. Someone who can carry a team through a crisis and make it look easy.

Jai Kashyap has a particular love for well-managed chaos—something that makes him perfectly suited to the fast-paced, always-on edge nature of the Joint Crisis Committee. As this year's Director, Jai brings a calm, observant energy to a committee built around unpredictability.

"I'd call it 90 Seconds of Fame," he said when asked what his committee would be as a reality show. "Some use it to shine, others to implode." And he meant it. His sessions are structured to move quickly—crisis updates drop without warning, debates follow with barely a beat, and speeches are delivered under pressure. Saurabhya Puri won his first MUN award, High Comm 2. Following the victory, he registered for the AMUN EB, got interviewed, and was selected to be JCC's rapporteur. Saurabhya's most memorable MUN experience is the final committee of AMUN 2024 where he wrote 7 full war directives in a day as a delegate. He says it doesn't sound like much, but his committee's astonishment is something he "will never forget".



Saurabhya's advice to anyone starting out in MUN is "Being confused is good, because that's when the fun is going to start." He says if you can keep learning in the confusion, you'll fit into any committee.

Besides MUN, Saurabhya loves chess, and a goal he's working toward with a friend is to create an AI recognition software for the blind to make chess inclusive, collaborating (hopefully) with the AICFB.

Saurabhya's first response to being asked about his music taste is "Oh God, ok,", because he has a lot to say on the topic. He listens to a fusion of alternative pop, hip hop, rap, EDM, and techno. His music taste ranges from Tupac to KALEO and Hozier, to Bobby Cole. His favourite songs are Killshot by Eminem ("as I hate MGK"), Way Down We Go by KALEO ("it's the perfect mix of peace and quiet to tempo"), and Bloodlines by Austin Wintory because he listens to it repeatedly while studying. His top artist is Eminem, though, because his mom listened to him when Saurabhya was a kid.

Despite hating that they killed Newt and Teresa within five minutes of the last movie, Saurabhya describes the Maze Runner series as the perfect mix of chaos, action, drama and mystery. He's a sucker for medical dramas, being a fan of The Good Doctor, and he loves Friends. If Saurabhya could make a movie about his life, he'd cast Jim Carrey as himself, because "he is unarguably the king of chaotic dumb brilliance acting", and he'd call the movie "Everything Everywhere All at Once", because it defines his life: "nothing makes sense and too much is going on all at the same time without pause."

His mom gave Saurabhya a mantra in a chess tournament: "confused, caffeinated and crushing it.". Another self-written mantra he follows is "Clarity is optional, chaos is consistent", meaning "you don't need to know everything to start something; sometimes you have the option to take a leap of faith, and you should. You can't sort the chaos out every time and have to learn to live with it."
